Eddy County 4-H needs to replace livestock buildings lost in 2008 and 2018 by building a recreational pavilion and renovating the historic auction barn. The overall goal includes the pavilion itself plus panels, cages, pens, and electricity. 4-H members would then have a sheltered space to do countless new activities such as archery competitions, livestock fitting clinics, and pheasant release. With our two buildings lost, proper space was needed to house show animals during the 2019 fair which is the reason why we acted on cementing the auction barn. Even with the space of the auction barn, there's still no room for larger livestock. This created a need for the pavilion.

By being involved in 4-H, youth learn a number of different skills. Our livestock program includes fitting and showmanship clinics which teach children how to handle and care for livestock correctly. Youth involved with showing livestock are also required to be Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) certified. YQCA is an opportunity to help educate young people in North Dakota on the importance of food safety and proper animal care as they work with their project animals diligently preparing them for their county fairs and North Dakota State Fair.

Electricity for the new recreational pavilion must run through the existing auction barn which is antiquated and must be replaced to continue to the pavilion. Completing the electricity throughout these two buildings is vital for community service project opportunities such as archery practice, pheasant release, and sheep lease.

Eddy County, the city of New Rockford, and the surrounding areas will all benefit from the recreational pavilion. Based on the Foster County Fair Grounds Pavilion, we can anticipate providing an outdoor setting for informal meetings, large picnics, wedding receptions, and family gatherings/reunions. The pavilion will also benefit Central North Dakota Steam Threshers annual reunion, providing much needed protected vendor space. When the weather is inclement, vendor participation and attendance is adversely impacted. It would additionally offer the community the opportunity to expand and enhance the youth archery program by providing a location to practice, compete in summertime archery season, and provide space for regional matches. The pavilion will also provide protection and cover for the 4-H educational events such as multi-county livestock fitting clinics, livestock show practice, 4-H Project Exploration Day, various day camps and workshops, and the livestock show during 4-H Achievement Days.

The Eddy County 4-H Program is proposing to build a 48' X 54' multi-use outdoor recreational pavilion on the Eddy County Fairgrounds and to finish out the renovation (includes livestock pens/panels and poultry cages) of the Auction Barn. Together it is estimated to cost a total of \$55,387.48. 4-H and Steam Thresher volunteers along with Eddy County Government have committed to the permit, setting the poles, hangings trusses, applying steal sheeting, assembling livestock panels, and providing sand for the floor. All buildings and equipment will be located on the Eddy Count Fairgrounds and therefore owned by Eddy County and will be available for public use.

The goal of 4-H is to develop citizenship, leadership, responsibility and life skills of youth through experiential learning programs and a positive youth development approach. 4-H’s hands-on approach is proven to grow life skills like confidence, independence, resilience and compassion through stages and developed through experiences, not instruction. 4-H’ers are four times more likely to give back to their communities, two times more likely to make healthier choices, and two times more likely to participate in STEM activities.

This organization heavily depends on volunteers who are usually parents of 4-H members. All boards are also made up of those same volunteers. These adult mentors provide guidance, ask questions, share learnings, and encourage.

One of the current programs includes Ag in the Gym. This program presents agriculture to over 500 3rd through 6th graders in Foster, Eddy, and Wells County and over a four-year span covers topics such as beef, dairy, sheep, oil crops, cereal grains, and nutrition. Four ten-minute, high impact stations are present that each group can interact with and then rotate within approximately a 45-minute class period. Based on the data collected in 2015, increases from the percent correct on the pre-test to the percent correct on the post-test questions are as follows; third grade test scores showed an increase of 30% in dairy, 28% in nutrition, and 48% in sheep. In sixth grade there was an increase of 54% in dairy, 43% in nutrition, and 64% in sheep.

We believe constructing a pavilion and renovating our historic auction barn will help increase 4-H enrollment and continue to build the future of agriculture not only in Eddy County but all of the surrounding areas.

This new project will provide a much-needed space for youth to further gain experience with agricultural practices and enhance wildlife habitat. One project the 4-H is eager to get started is an annual pheasant release. Working closely with the local gun club, 4-Her's will have a new experience with shooting sports and raising pheasants for release.

4-H will promote developing and enhancing conservation of wildlife by housing the pheasants in the auction barn along with shooting sports practice under the pavilion. Pheasants will arrive April or May. 4-H members along with our adult volunteers will have the responsibility of caring for these pheasants until their release in June or July. Meanwhile, members enrolled in shooting sports practice a number of different disciplines such as air rifle, archery, black powder, and shot gun throughout the summer. As pheasant season opens in the fall, youth will now be able to put their shooting sports practice to use in the field as this learning experience comes full circle.

Another important aspect of 4-H is how it is so strongly involved with agriculture. Land and range judging practice, Youth for the Quality Care of Animals, and sheep lease program will all take place under this pavilion and in the renovated auction barn. Purchasing proper panels, pens, cages, and fitting stands play a role in 4-H members learning how to correctly care for their animals. Underneath the pavilion, livestock showmanship and fitting clinics will also take place. At these clinics, youth learn the correct diet and shearing/fitting techniques for a variety of different species. Shearing and fitting play major roles with show stock. For example, some species are kept in climate-controlled facilities to promote winter coat growth. They learn that with a winter coat provides more hair and longer hair on an animal, hair can be trimmed and manipulated to hide flaws in the animal (similar to make up for humans.) To ensure animal safety, these animals will be provided shade under the pavilion during our July County Fair as more hair also means the animal retains more body heat.

This pavilion will serve as a great opportunity for other recreational activities as well. New Rockford's annual Central North Dakota Steam Threshers Reunion event pulls people from different counties, states, and even countries. With new electricity, Steam Threshers will be able to use the auction barn for some vendors as a new pavilion will create a much-needed protected space for the rest of the vendors. Bad weather will often send vendors home because there is not enough covered building space left. This space will also be utilized for informal meetings, family occasions, wedding receptions, day camps, and multicounty educational youth activities.

Youth shooting sports of multiple disciplines, pheasant release, and sheep lease programs are all new activities to Eddy County. Long term, there are limitless possibilities with this renovation and recreational pavilion, all in which help grow 4-H and the community.

Eddy County 4-H has already received a number of quotes for the renovation of the auction barn and construction of the pavilion. Once enough money has been secured, contractors and electricians will be contacted and scheduled to start construction.

Extension Agents spend a majority of their time programming and organizing 4-H events. The 4-H program has also continuously taken care of these buildings since the inception of the 4-H program in Eddy County dating back to the early 1900's. Eddy County 4-H has also worked closely with the local lumber yard for many years. Therefore, we are confident in our management skills to follow through with this project.

4-H will use a number of different strategies to measure success. With the construction of the Eddy County Recreational Pavilion and renovation of the Auction Barn, it will allow for sheltered space to be rented at a premium to vendors during the annual Central North Dakota Steam Threshers Reunion. Winter rentals for recreational vehicles and equipment will also be available. During warmer temperatures, community and family events will also be able to enjoy this space at a rental fee. This rent money will be used to help pay for electricity and building maintenance.

This project will be heavily impacted if only partial funding is given although we are grateful for any support given. We already anticipate doing community drives but are limited because Eddy County is a small community to begin with. We are concerned how affective these community drives will be with Eddy County being an agriculture-based community and given the current agricultural issues due to disastrous weather. The community as a whole will be finically impacted from farmers having to be conservative with their income causing a trickle-down effect onto community businesses.

Conservation Plan

Our goal with this project is to rebuild the disconnect today's youth have from agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting. We plan to achieve this goal by offering new educational opportunities and expanding our already existing programs.

4-H Shooting Sports in Eddy County has gained an immense amount of interest since June 2019 when the local gun club expressed the need for youth involvement with conservation type activity. Along with learning how to use and respect firearms correctly, youth will learn about conservation and how hunting plays an important role. Wildlife managers know that wildlife cannot be stockpiled. Animals will die each year; it's just a question of how they die. Where hunting is allowed, fewer animals will die of diseases, accidents, parasites, etc. Controlled hunting is an important wildlife management tool. Controlled hunting helps keep wildlife numbers well within the carrying capacity of the habitat and also allows hunters an opportunity to enjoy fresh venison, fowl, and other game meat.

Our Eddy County 4-H program has 43% combined Shooting Sports involvement with members and volunteers. Overall member enrollment has also increased 26% because of the introduction of Shooting Sports.

The pavilion will offer opportunity for youth archery practice, livestock fitting and showmanship clinics, and agricultural classes/trainings open to the public. An example of an agricultural training would be our current no-till session we host during the spring. This promotes the benefits of no-till like building soil health, eliminating soil erosion, and drastically increases water infiltration and therefore retention (less evaporation.) This means there is less runoff of contaminated water into the environment. Attendees learn better farming practices and makes agriculture more sustainable as a whole.

Meanwhile, the renovated barn will offer space to house sheep for the 4-H sheep lease program, pheasant chicks for pheasant release, livestock during Achievement Day, and a sheltered space for countless other activities. The sheep lease program provides experience with livestock and how they can play an important role in the ecosystem such as multi-species grazing. Youth learn without grazing; native grasslands die resulting in desertification and that properly managed grazing regenerates the grassland and builds the soil. They also learn about the efficiency of weed control since different species of livestock prefer different plants and control brush when browsers are included.

Starting early spring, the pheasant release program will start by committed 4-H sponsors purchasing pheasant chicks for the program. 4-H members will tend to the needs of these chicks over the course of roughly 8 weeks. Pheasants will be released on a permitted site already obtained by our sponsors. Meanwhile, members enrolled in shooting sports practice a number of different disciplines such as air rifle, archery, black powder, and shot gun throughout the summer. Fast-forward to youth pheasant weekend, now our members who tended to these pheasants can now put their shooting sports (shotgun) practice to use in the field as this learning experience comes full circle.

4-H will use a number of different strategies to measure success. Those strategies are number of livestock exhibits, number of agronomy projects, hunting/wildlife projects, community service projects, enrollment numbers, activity attendance, frequency of activities, and the number of new activities to measure the success of this project. All of these are on track to increase with the renovation/completion of the Auction Barn and Eddy County Recreational Pavilion. Together, both the pavilion and renovated barn go hand in hand providing a much-needed space for not only youth education but for the community to grow as a whole.

We view this project will have long term beneficial impacts on the environment surrounding us as it becomes more established by promoting more sustainable agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting practices.

Clarification needed for 'under 12' beef calf, 'a small animal', 'baby beef' now called Beef Calf Project. A motion was made by Jorgenson to align this information to the state fair book. Second by Widmer. Motion carried.

New Fundraisers:

Lots of discussion was held regarding fundraisers. Tammy Widmer shared gaming information. A 50/50 raffle idea was discussed to try at the Steam Thresher's meal this fall. The extension office will contact the Steam Thresher Board to give notice and request approval for Eddy County 4-H to hold this activity during the 4-H meal on Saturday and Sunday.

Reorganize Executive Council:

Jenna Helseth remains on the council, with Patti Jo Larson, Amy Wobbema, and Natalie Becker's terms being up; however, they can continue to serve on the council if nominated.

Nominations for Katie Jorgenson, Tim Becker, Natalie Becker, Amy Wobbema, and Chelsea Swart were made. Paper voting was held and the following were elected:

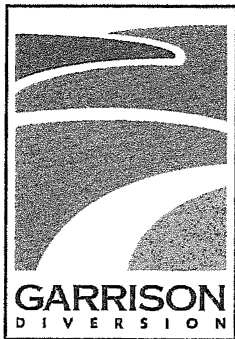
