Trails Restoration and Improvement Program 001-015

The Sheyenne Valley and Dakota Prairie Grasslands Chapters of the North Country Trail Association (NCTA) have been working hard on their projects this summer. Even given the wet spring and late start into the work season, the volunteers logged over 1,000 working hours on the Outdoor Heritage Fund Project. These hours do not include trail mowing, general trail maintenance and the work being done by the Army Corp of Engineers and US Forest Service on other sections of the trail in North Dakota. There is a diverse group of volunteers working on this project that include NCTA members from ND and other states, Doosan volunteers and Boy Scouts; including 52 volunteers in all. Their work activities even included two Eagle Scout projects.

The Turtle Mountain Trail Project is set to be bid out this winter with construction to start summer 2015. The North Dakota trail crew spent some time in the Turtle Mountains with a GPS finalizing the best sustainable routes around the wet areas to better develop the bid packet this winter.





Outdoor Heritage Fund Grant:

- Logged 1,186 hours of volunteer labor
- Replaced 5 miles of broken Carsonite signage, hand carried equipment and materials including steel U-posts with Carsonite pieces with applicable signage
- Re-routed about a 1/3 mile of trail and installed a new fence stile on private right of way on trail that had slumped beyond use, removed old route signage materials
- NCT chapters recruited, trained and provided safety training to 52 volunteers which included NCT members, Doosan volunteers and Boy Scouts. The NCT chapters led these volunteers during several full and part time day work projects (with no accidents)
- Re-blazed throughout 4.2 miles of trail
- Purchased, received and stored construction materials and supplies
- Acquired regular trail access easement (1 mile; 20 years). Securing this easement allowed the connection of the NCT from the Ekre Preserve to the Sheyenne Grasslands





- Installed trail signage in a number of locations, including Carsonite marker posts along the trail, signage at several fence stile crossings, intersections and NCCNST signage through Abercrobie and Colfax
- Installed 7 (2' x 2') interpretive panels at trail heads



Trails Restoration and Improvement Program 001-015 continued

- Moved materials to remote construction sites and built 8 puncheon sections totaling 126 feet
- Moved materials to remote construction sites and built and/or remodeled 10 fence stiles and gates
- Identified, marked, mowed, cleared, and signed about 1.5 miles of new trail
- Identified about 2 miles of new potential trail routes, with construction planning underway



Additional NCT Activities this summer

- GPS'd over 29 miles of trail to produce permanent mapping of route, also included GPS locations for trail signage, stiles, boardwalks, telespar posts, trail heads, interpretive panels etc. built in past 3 years
- Drafted and prepared mailing materials for 3 easements and working on 12 additional for approximately 11 ³/₄ miles of trail
- Initiated many conversations regarding trail access and development with Corps of Engineers,
 Griggs County Water Board and their engineer;
- Mowed over 50 miles of trail
- Initiated many conversations regarding trail access and development with city officials, landowners, government employees, etc.
- . Developed new maps and informational materials for distribution to trail users
